The Drouillard Family from France to the Detroit River Region – Part 1 Simon Drouillard and His Family in France

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In the April 2008 Michigan's Habitant Heritage¹ Simon Drouillard dit Argencourt's origin and family in Marennes, Charente-Maritime, France, were presented. At that time the only way to do research in France was the consultation of microfilms at a local Family History Center, i.e. the Mormons. It was an expensive, tedious process, which, at the time, limited the research that might be able to be done concerning a family. The French departmental archives are now all online and free. As a result, more research was able to be done on Simon Drouillard's mother's Chevrou family as well as a few additional facts concerning the Drouillard family itself. The origin of the Drouillard family is still unknown.

Simon's Drouillard's parents, Jean Drouillard and Anne Chevrou, were married 30 August 1666 in Marennes.² Unfortunately, as was typical at the time, no parents were named for either party. The witnesses were Pierre Mercier, husband of Jeanne Chevrou, possibly a sister of Anne Chevrou; Jean Drouillard; Étienne Drouillard; and Michel Baudet. The family connection among these Drouillards is not known.

The first record found for Jean Drouillard in Marennes was on 1 July 1663 when he was a godfather to Elizabeth, daughter of Jean Crirot and Jeanne Rabeau. On 31 January 1666, he and his future wife, Anne Chevrou, were godparents to Anne Mercier, daughter of Pierre Mercier and Jeanne Chevrou. The next act for him was his marriage.

He and Anne Chevrou were the parents of eight children in Marennes:5

- 1.) Paul, baptized 29 May 1667.
- 2.) Simon, born 10 November 1668 and baptized the 28th.
- 3.) Catherine, born 23 December 1668 and baptized 12 January 1670. Her godmother was Catherine Drouillard, but the family relationship was not stated.
- 4.) François, born 27 September 1671 and baptized 4 October 1671.
- 5.) Gabrielle, born 12 October 1674 and baptized the 28th. Her father was said to be absent.
- 6.) Pierre, born 20 December 1675 and baptized 20 July 1676. His father was said to be absent.
- 7.) Magdelaine, born 20 December 1677 and baptized 19 June 1678.
- 8.) Jeanne, born 11 February 1681 and baptized 30 March 1681. Again, her father was said to be absent.

In none of the records, found to date in Marennes, is Jean Drouillard's occupation stated. It is possible he worked in the salt marshes in the area. Or he worked as a *marinier*, a mariner. The records for Marennes were researched, and nothing was found after the last baptism for the Drouillard family through the year 1710.

A source that was not available in 2008 was GeneaNet, a subscription service. By putting in the name of Jean Drouillard, a source was given that a Jean Drouillard, aged 49, (which would indicate he was born circa 1636), a matelot du port (sailor in the port), a native of Marennes, died in the hospital in Rochefort on 27 April 1685 and was buried in the hospital's cemetery.⁶




Based on the assumption that this Jean Drouillard was Simon Drouillard's father, the research continued in Rochefort. The two churches in Rochefort were Notre-Dame Hors Les Murs, the extant records began 13 September 1665, and Saint-Louis, whose records began in 1687. On 20 August 1679, in Rochefort, a Jean Drouillard was witness to the burial of Jean Mognan/Monnau, a watchman. Perhaps his absences during the baptism of some of his children can now be explained – he was working in Rochefort. See the above map to see the distance between Marennes and Rochefort.

It is possible this is "our" Jean Drouillard, and he worked in Rochefort, a town which was a city created as a port de guerre et de l'arsenal (port for war and an arsenal) by Charles Colbert de Terron, a first cousin of Jean Baptiste Colbert (Minister of Finances for Louis XIV from 1665 to 1683). Colbert de Terron was given the responsibility of finding a place on the Atlantic that was capable of providing an arsenal which could become a place of refuge, defense, and a supply depot. Brouage had been considered, but, in December 1665, Rochefort was chosen. There were several reasons for choosing Rochefort: (1) protection from enemy ships because of the small islands surrounding it; (2) the war port of Brouage had been ensablé (surrounded by sand); (3) the mudflats surrounding it would be good for stranding vessels; (4) the owner of the land, a Calvinist named Jacques Henry, seigneur de Cheusses, was "forced" to sell the land; (5) the near-by Charente River and its canals were conducive to the transportation of the needed materials of wood, food, metals, toiles (canvas), and denrées (food products) from the rich areas of Saintonge, Périgord, and Limousin.8



The Jean Drouillard family appeared to have settled in Rochefort because their last child, Joseph, was born on the second of March 1683 and baptized on the 4th in Notre-Dame. In this act it was noted that Jean Drouillard was a gardien de vesseau (a ship's watchman).

Not quite one year later, on 20 January 1684, Anne Chevrou, wife of Jean Drouillard, gardien de vesseau, aged about 43 years (born circa 1641), a native of Marennes, was buried. Since no burial records have been found for any of the children of Jean Drouillard and Anne Chevrou, it can only be assumed that nine children survived, including Simon. When their father died in April 1685, there were possibly nine orphans.



Only three additional records concerning this family has been found in Rochefort: (1) On 4 November 1689, in Saint-Louis, Rochefort, Catherine Drouillard was a godmother. If she was the daughter of Jean Drouillard and Anne Chevrou, she was not quite 20 years old at the time. (2) On 15 October 1691, in Saint-Louis, Rochefort, Paul Drouillard, the eldest son, was at a witness at the marriage of his cousin Anne Mercier, a native of Marennes, who had lived in Rochefort for eight years, to **René Borde**, a merchant and widower who had lived in Rochefort for 18 years. Paul Drouillard signed the act. (3) On 30 June 1693, Saint-Louis, Rochefort, Paul Drouillard, [aged 26], a carpenter, was a godfather and signed. These were the last acts, found to date, for this family in Rochefort. The fate of all of the siblings of Simon Drouillard dit Argencourt is not known.

Additional information on the Chevrou family

The first records for the Chevrou family were found in extant records in Marennes in 1589 when a **Jehan Chevrou** was a godfather. After this date there were records for two distinct Chevrou families: the family of **Abraham Chevrou** and **Jeanne Mitouard**, married 28 June 1597 in Marennes¹⁴ and **Jean Chevrou** and **Isabelle/Élisabeth Martineau**, whose date and place of marriage are not known. The latter couple was the ancestors of Anne Chevrou, wife of Jean Drouillard and were the parents of five known children:

- 1) Philippe 15 November 1598 married Judicq Hilaire, 25 July 1630
- 2) Guillaume 19 May 1601 married Marie Mourou/Maurouse, date and place unknown
- 3) Denis 16 March 1603 fate unknown
- 4) Anne 19 April 1609 married Jean Beaudry, 25 July 1630
- 5) Mathurin 1 April 1612 possibly married 27 November 1642 to Janette Mallet

The Chevrou families used many of the same first names over and over (Jean, Anne, Marie, Jeanne, Guillaume), making it tricky, if not very difficult, to follow family lines. Based on people present for baptisms, marriages, and burials (found with regularity after 1670), most family lines can be established. Thus, it is possible to state with certainty that Guillaume Chevrou and Marie Maurouse were the parents of the following seven children.

- 1) Jeanne 5 August 1634; Philippe Chevrou, godfather; married Pierre Mercier, 31 January 1664; buried in Marennes 28 August 1679 at the age of 42 (born circa 1637)
- 2) Jean 8 December 1635; married Andrée Beaudry 20 April 1665; buried 20 September 1703 at the age of 70 (born circa 1633) in presence of his son Louis Chevrou and his son-in-law Pierre Druneau
- 3) Elisabeth 10 May 1637 fate unknown
- 4) Anne 11 December 1639 married Jean Drouillard, 30 August 1666; buried in Rochefort 20 January 1684 at the age of 43 (born *circa* 1641)
- 5) Jean 1 December 1641 Philippe Chevrou signed as a witness; fate unknown
- 6) Anne 28 May 1645; (1) married Joseph Roy, 17 June 1669, in presence of her brother Jean Chevrou and Pierre Mercier, her brother-in-law; (2) Pierre Metereau, 3 August 1676; buried 2 July 1710, age 66 (born circa 1644) in presence of her husband Pierre Metereau and her son-in-law Jean Tourtier
- 7) Ozanne 30 January 1650 fate unknown

The very few times that an occupation was listed with any of the men it was the occupation of *saulnier* (an extractor or seller of salt). Occasionally the term of *marinier* (sailor) was also used. Now the town and region are famous for their oysters.
